

## Egyptian Gods and Goddesses

Ancient Egyptian religion was one of the most elaborate belief systems the world has ever seen, featuring over two thousand gods and goddesses who were worshipped for thousands of years. These deities governed every aspect of existence, from the rising of the sun to the flooding of the Nile, from childbirth to death and the afterlife.

Most Egyptian gods were depicted in a combination of human and animal form, each animal chosen to represent the god's particular qualities. Ra, the supreme sun god, wore a falcon's head and a solar disc crown. He was believed to cross the sky daily in his sacred boat, and his nightly passage through the dangerous underworld symbolised death and rebirth.

Osiris, often shown with green skin, ruled over the afterlife and was central to Egyptian beliefs about death and judgement. His murder by his jealous brother Set, and his resurrection by his devoted wife Isis, formed one of Egypt's most important myths. Their son Horus, the falcon-headed sky god, became the symbol of divine kingship, and every pharaoh was considered his earthly representative.

Other significant deities included Anubis, the jackal-headed guardian of mummification, and Thoth, the ibis-headed god of wisdom and writing, who was said to have invented hieroglyphics.

Enormous temple complexes were constructed across Egypt, staffed by priests who performed sacred rituals daily. Far from being simply a set of stories, Egyptian religion shaped law, medicine, art, and political power throughout one of history's greatest civilisations.
